

GROUNDBREAKING LEGISLATION ENSURES FREE TUITION

Working closely with elected officials, we brought to life a new law that empowers WVMCCD to waive all tuition fees for residents living within our service area. AB 3158, passed in September 2024, cuts out complicated forms and delays, making it as easy as enrolling and attending.

"This new legislation expands access to higher education and removes financial barriers for thousands of students. It positions us to better serve students and our broader community in the years to come," says Chancellor Bradley Davis.

STEWARDSHIP ROOTED IN EXPERIENCE

"I'm a proud product of California public schools — from kindergarten through law school — and community college played a pivotal role in my path. I want to ensure others have the same opportunities I had."

Board President Anne Kepner knows firsthand how transformative a public education, especially community college, can be. After struggling during her freshman year at a four-year college, she transferred to her local community college, and set her life on a new path.

"I had been in a sea of people but when I got to community college, I felt seen and heard and I got the attention I needed," she remembers. With renewed confidence, she earned her associate degree, then went on to succeed at a four-year college and then law school — both at public universities in California.

Anne takes her stewardship role very seriously and has served as WVMCCD board president five times during her 10-year tenure as a trustee. Under her leadership, the District has implemented new programs and changes that make our colleges more accessible and increase stu-

"She cares deeply about her community and inspires others to make improvements to education and quality of life," according to Chancellor Davis. "She's both strong and kind, and she knows how to drive positive change."

"We're moving our District in the right direction to remove barriers and make college more accessible," Anne says. "Our students arrive eager to learn, but about twothirds of them face housing, food, and financial insecurities that make it hard to bring their best selves into the classroom. They need significant support to be prepared to learn and funding to make it financially possible."

That's why the board is also prioritizing hiring and retaining engaged faculty and supportive staff at West Valley and Mission, she says. "They're the ones connecting with students and supporting them inside and outside the classroom. We're seeing results, and we're making a difference in the lives of people in our community."

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SUPPORTING STUDENTS Laura Fierro Barrios '23 was 16 years old when she came to the United States with limited English and a dream of attending college - but no roadmap for navigating California's higher education system. Her high school counselor recommended she start with community college, and Mission College supported her every step of the way to make graduation a reality. Counselors at Mission guided her through applying for Mission College scholarships and other financial assistance, which was a game-changer. The tuition she saved then now makes it easier for her to afford UC Berkeley, where she's a year away from graduating with a psychology degree. Additional support - including public transportation and gas vouchers, free cafeteria meals, and book stipends – helped her stay focused on her studies and find a job that would enhance her skills and enable her to complete her education. "I didn't have the burden of worrying about money, food, or transportation while I was adjusting to college," says Laura. "I found my job on campus at Extended Opportunity Program and Services (EOPS), where I improved my English and professional skills while supporting other students along the way." Unique Programs and Powerful Partnerships

As workforce demands evolve in Silicon Valley and across California, so do the programs at West Valley-Mission.

To address the state's nursing shortage and the urgent need for skilled professionals in public safety and emergency response, we're launching new degrees and forging strategic partnerships.

A NEW BACHELOR'S DEGREE TO STRENGTHEN LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY



From wildfires to public health crises, California faces growing threats — yet our workforce remains critically understaffed in disaster preparedness, crisis management, and emergency medical services. Mission College has long been a leader in training firefighters and emergency medical technicians, and now our new Bachelor of Science in Emergency Services Administration will equip the next generation of first responders with the leadership skills and expertise to tackle the complexities of public safety in the Bay Area and beyond. Earning this valuable bachelor's degree at no cost is an unprecedented opportunity for students.

PARTNERSHIP WITH SUTTER HEALTH EXPANDS PRACTICAL LEARNING FOR NURSES

We're building a pipeline of nurses to fill the growing nursing shortage in the Bay Area. Our registered nurse, vocational nurse, and nurse assistant programs provide students with hands-on clinical experience at leading health-care institutions. Now, through a new partnership with Sutter Health, we're expanding our impact even further.

The 700,000-square-foot Sutter West Santa Clara Campus healthcare hub will provide care in numerous specialties, alongside advanced diagnostic imaging, lab services, and more. And when West Valley-Mission's new 70,000-square-foot STEM Center opens next door, students will have a seamless pathway to internships, specialized training, and career readiness.

A CAMPUS FOR EVERYONE


